Preserving Tax Deductions & Connecting Local Hubs

At this week's Legislative Session, the Board of Trustees will consider a resolution asking representaives in Congress to oppose the elimination of the deduction for State and Local Taxes (SALT). In New York, 34% of taxpayers claim this deduction, with an average deduction of \$7,182. This concern was brought to our attention by the New York Conference of Mayors, who point out that if Congress votes to take away SALT, "millions of family in NYS will be hit with a 'one-two punch' of higher taxes and lower home values. This will harm village bottom lines and hurt our ability to provide key services." To read the

Come learn more about a grant from the Hudson River Valley Greenway to develop a plan for an Open Space/Bike Lane/Commerce Connectivity Corridor. Check out the draft maps and offer your input. The Village is pleased to be partnering with the Towns of Ossining & New Castle on a plan to create enhanced pedestrian and bike access between commercial zones and open space. The goal is to connect the Ossining Train Station and waterfront to the business districts in Downtown Ossining and along North State Road, reaching the Millwood Hamlet, as well as connecting the many beloved open spaces in the region. This trail network will be an "Emerald Necklace" for the region, bolstering economic development and the tourism industry, while reducing the community's environmental impact through the conservation of open space and decreased dependence on cars for transportation.

The first two sessions will be on Thursday, October 5 at 1pm-2pm or 7pm-8pm at Club Fit Briarcliff Café, 584 N. State Road, Briarcliff Manor, NY. The second two will be on Thursday, November 2 at 1pm-2pm or 7pm-8pm at the Ossining Public Library Café, 53 Croton Avenue, Ossining, NY. Refreshments and giveaways from Club Fit Briarcliff will be provided to forum participants.
